On each volume content page there are a few topic highlights that 'popped up' from that volume's content.

Koitiata Matters is a very apt community newsletter title, first applied by Joyce Smith, an avid village wordsmith on the April 2001 issue. A continuing use for close to a hundred issues over the next sixteen years, earns it the rightful place as the encompassing title for this collection of records for Koitiata's history.

Differing formats and many authors over a period of 39 years. A quote from a resident: "It is tempting to rate the content to help you to avoid reading some which are possibly a waste of time, paper, and space. But if the rating system was for effort on the part of the numerous 'Newsletter Editors' then they would probably all be 5-star. And if all the content, styles, and formats were rated as to their usefulness they would collectively rate 10 out of 10 for being an integral building block of the Koitiata community."

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING SUNDAY MARCH 20th AT 2 PM

Why should you attend?

This is the meeting at which we set our objectives for the year. It is also the time when we appoint a new committee. It is very important that we keep a turn over of residents on the committee to ensure that all interests are represented - and to give those who keep volunteering a rest! The secretary/treasurer position will become vacant this year.

What does the Koitiata Residents Committee do?

The Committee is sanctioned by the local authorities to be the means of communication with Koitiata. While all residents have the right to approach Council at any time, experience shows that we make very little progress in this way. Council is more inclined to engage in discussion with groups who present a collective case. They also find it more economical of time and money to deliver information and advice through Community Groups.

How does it work?

Under instruction from the residents, **the main committee** liases directly with the Rangitikei District Council, Horizons, Department of Conservation and other similar bodies. It manages the Community Centre and the financial account.

The ford subcommittee is responsible for the maintenance of the ford and its approaches. It maintains the surface, markers and drainage ditches. It has no dedicated funds. Peter Fraser is the signatory to the Resource Consent on our behalf.

The social subcommittee organises greetings cards and gifts as appropriate, Market Day, the Christmas Party, happy hours, and those little extra things which make life pleasant. It has a petty cash allowance.

The Community Centre Caretaker is paid a small sum by the Council for general maintenance. The Caretaker is responsible for cleaning the Centre after it has been hired out, for replenishing soap, towels and toilet paper. It is up to all of us who use the hall for general purposes (without payment) to clean up after ourselves. The current Caretaker (Tom Dooney) also liaises with the lawn mowing contractor.

The Koitiata Residents' Committee meeting was held on 07 May and the following issues were discussed:-

- Letter written to the Council about the correct spelling of Rapaki Street.
- Concerns expressed for safety of both children riding mini motorized bikes on Koitiata roads and the safety of pedestrians
- Concerns over the speed at which some people enter the village. Coming straight out of a open road speed into a 50km area takes time for motorists to remember to slow down
- BBQ chimney from the play area is currently away being repaired
- Local councilor attended and a submission will be forwarded to RDC concerning the Ford expressing their short and long term needs. \$500 per annum for ongoing maintenance and that if the RDC ever constructed a permanent crossing that it be levied over all Rangitikei District ratepayers. Any other submissions over rates etc will have to be by individual submission.
- Letter to be sent to RDC over the need to fix up the paint work on the hall.

 A new fire vehicle is to be purchased in the near future.

I was first inspired to play the banjo when I saw Mark Warren from Marton play the Beverly Hillbillies 3 years ago. I bought my first banjo off Mark & got lessons from him.

Mum & Dad are very supportive of me & as we travel around NZ it's a great chance to meet a lot of people in different parts of the country. We came across Jacko & Karen Jackson "Fiddlesticks" & their two boys George & Mackenzie who were buying a house in Marton. They came to the Gypsy Fair for a season & as we traveled

together, we kids got to play a lot. George (the eldest son) who already played the fiddle, started learning the banjo & Mackenzie, who play Bodrhan & Djembe, brought a mandolin as we got into some bluegrass. We entered the Gore Country Music Awards together calling ourselves "Pick it Fence" & we won the Intermediate Band Section. George & I were runners up in the Intermediate Instrumental section playing a double banjo tune & Karen, George, Mackenzie & I won the busking competition.

At the end of the season – 6mths ago – the Jackson's sadly moved to Australia to tour schools over there, but since then I've been to the Wellington Folk Festival. Tahora Music Festival & most recently, the Auckland Folk Festival where I won the 15-18 vr old Martin Blackman Young Performers Award & the Frank Winter Memorial Award for \$1000 which I'll be spending on a trip to America in June. There, mum and I will be going to 2 bluegrass festivals & 3 schools/camps where I'll be learning from some of the best musicians in the world, including Tony Trisckha, Alan Munde, Bill Erens & Alison Brown.

Monthly Profile

This month we are profiling Peter Bamford who is the Controller of our Koitiata Volunteer Rural Fire Service:-

When asked to do a profile on my life, it set me thinking on what I had achieved in 69 years.

I was born in Christchurch in 1937, and later moved to a farm in Balfour. Due to ill health, my parents moved to Temuka. There, I joined the Boy Scouts and played rugby and tennis. Later we shifted to Kaiapoi where I continued to play sport, including taking up rowing.

When I left school I joined the Post and Telegraph Office in Kaiapoi, but when I found the office environment didn't suit me, I transferred to the Christchurch construction branch of the Post Office, later to become part of Telecom. During my 36 years at the Post Office/Telecom, I took up positions in Fielding, Motueka, Wanganui and finally in Marton, where I was Supervising Overseer.

Due to Post Office restructuring, I was made redundant in 1988. I shifted back to Wanganui, working at Wanganui Power Tool Centre for six years, before retiring in 1994 to Koitiata.

At Koitiata, fishing and white baiting became part of my interests.

I joined the Koitiata Rural Fire in 1994, and was nominated to the position of Controller in 1998. This involved taking fire fighting courses and passing unit standards. I was also appointed Deputy Principal Rural Fire Officer for the Rangitikei District, a position I held for four years.

Jeanette and I have enjoyed our life at the beach, but with a few health problems, have decided it is time to move on.

Peter and Jeanette move away from the village mid July. They will both be missed and Peter's expertise and experience with the Rural Fire Service will be hard to replace.

The following is an extract from a 1934 AA magazine "Motorists" on how to get to Turakina Beach...

WANGANUI TO TURAKINA BEACH. 19 miles -

Take the Main South Road passing through Whangaehu (9½ miles) to Turakina (3 miles). Proceed past Railway Hotel passing Turakina Valley Road on left, and turning right about 100 yards further on, stone water trough. Continue on for about 3 miles until a gate is reached. The road now passes through private property and the motorist is request to close all gates. The track now crosses paddocks for about 3 miles terminating about 100 yards short of the river (19 miles). A sandhill is crossed and then it is necessary to wade across the river to reach the beach. The river at the mouth runs south along the beach for about 1½ miles before it reaches the sea.

Councillor's Corner

Hello from your friendly councillor.

Well as you know the election candidates have put their names forward for a seat on the council. We have three candidates contesting for the Turakina ward which is the ward where Koitiata is.

I have put my name forward for a second term and would like to get the chance to put into practice what I have learnt in the past three years. Believe me the next three years is going to be a very important time for the Rangitikei district, as I believe we will be under increased pressure to merge with neighbouring councils. It will not be a time for new councillors to be learning. I believe experience is going to be very important as we will have a new mayor and a new chief executive officer.

Another very important situation arising is the presentation of the Horizons Regional Council "One Plan".

This plan will have serious affects on the way we run our lives. Did you know that under this new one plan (if it goes ahead):

- 1. You will have to control the smoke, dust, odour, or water vapour so as not to go beyond the boundary of the source of the fire, i.e. rubbish fires
- 2. The burning of tyres is prohibited even for a heat source or lighting source for rubbish fires. Resource consent must be applied for this activity.
- 3. If the council wants to take a corner off a road it has to get resource consent from Horizons
- 4. There will be lots of rules governing the coastal marine area which includes the beaches and the seabed. If you can get a copy of the coast part of the plan I urge you to read it. I can print you a copy off my computer if you want.
- 5. Farmers will be not allowed to plough the ground within 10 meters of a waterway which has a bank waterway of less than 15 degrees.

6. Farmers and contractors will not be allowed to get fertilizer into waterways (not sure how topdressing aircraft and spreader trucks are going to prevent this)

Most of the plan is very good and is designed to protect our environment. There are some parts as mentioned above that need our input. Please if you have a question or want to submit anything please give me a call. 063426741

The One Plan is open to submissions until the end of September. The submissions will be considered and voted on by your regional councillors. It will have to be passed through the voting process and is planned to come into law about end of 2008. The Rangitikei District Council is putting together a very extensive submission which addresses most of the issues in contention.

Well until the next newsletter all the best and maybe will see you at the met the candidates evening on the 14th September at 7.30 at the church hall Turakina.

And just another reminder to you all, that in the event of a fire in a Koitiata house or surrounding area, the local Fire Force or other Brigades called on must use whatever water supply is available. There is no water reticulation in the village and water carried by appliances is limited. In the urgency of a fire situation, the nearest household water tank will be drawn from, whether the house is occupied or vacant. Speed being essential – there is no time to consult with the owners. Water used from a household tank will be replaced at the earliest opportunity – this is a policy of the Fire Service. People will not be left without water. However, in the race to set up pumps, there is little time to discuss the matter. Fire control must take precedence over all else.

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May 2008

Well after a bit of a break, I thought it was time to get into gear and produce another newsletter. I had a good break and enjoyed an interesting holiday. I haven't had time to get out and about, so this newsletter may be a bit on the light side.

I remember when the river first cut in across the front of the sand dunes the residents were rife with speculation about whether the river would eventually come up over into the lagoon area. Some frequently asked questions about village raffles

Why do we have raffles?

The social club holds regular raffles to cover the cost of the following:

- 1. A stock of amenities for the Community Hall eg salt, pepper, tea, coffee, sugar, dish washing liquid, serviettes.
- 2. Pre and post dinner nibbles for pot luck dinners nuts, chippies, chocolates etc.
- 3. An assortment of greetings cards for residents' highs and lows.
- 4. Any items or projects according to the elected social sub-committee's policy (the last one was New Year's Eve entertainment)

How are raffles organised?

Raffles are currently held every month at pot luck dinners. Tickets are sold and the raffle is drawn at the dinner. We usually hold extra raffles at public holidays. For these, tickets may be sold door-to-door.

How much are raffle tickets?

Tickets are currently one dollar each.

Do ticket holders have to be present at the draw to win prizes?

No. Just leave contact details.

What proportion of the raffle money is spent on prizes?

Over the year it will be approximately half, although this may vary from one raffle to the next as we never know how many tickets will be sold.

Are extra numbers added to a raffle once it has commenced?

No.

How do I know who has won the raffle?

Winners are published on the Hall notice board and in the next newsletter.

What happens to the money if there is a build up of funds over time?

The social subcommittee keeps a petty cash float of up to \$100. Any surplus goes to the main committee fund to be used as the committee decides.

Can I have a say in raffle policy?

Yes you can stand for election to the main or social-sub committee in June.

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November 2008

By the time you get this newsletter, there will only be 6 weeks to Xmas. It creeps up on you fast doesn't it?

I was looking back at last year's November newsletter where I publicly thanked those who helped me when I got stuck down the beach, well quess what? It happened again. October is normally a windy month and the sand in many places is very soft and yes I became stuck once again. After my fruitless attempts to free myself, I had to admit defeat and called upon my friendly neighbour (and his brother-in-law) to help me out once again. The first thing he did when he arrived at the scene was to stop and take a photo! Only he would think of taking a camera when going to the rescue of someone who gets stranded. I believe he did spread the picture around, but now that I have paid him back in Speights, it should never have to resurface again. One rescue a year isn't a bad record.

I was rather bewildered last month, to hear that a contractor was down at the beach with his digger burying dead animals. When questioned, the contractor actually stated that there were 135 to do, and that he was contracted by the Council to do this. I knew the location of at least 4 or 5 dead animals, but 135? Reflecting over the past year in the village, we had our usual highs and lows, deaths and major medical operations. The river changed course, the beach changed, two new houses were added to the village, old baches have been done up, our 135 stinking dead animals on the beach were buried, a couple of engagements and weddings, some major "0" birthdays, pronunciation lessons for street names, people have left, new ones have joined us.
