On each volume content page there are a few topic highlights that 'popped up' from that volume's content.

Koitiata Matters is a very apt community newsletter title, first applied by Joyce Smith, an avid village wordsmith on the April 2001 issue. A continuing use for close to a hundred issues over the next sixteen years, earns it the rightful place as the encompassing title for this collection of records for Koitiata's history.

Differing formats and many authors over a period of 39 years. A quote from a resident: "It is tempting to rate the content to help you to avoid reading some which are possibly a waste of time, paper, and space. But if the rating system was for effort on the part of the numerous 'Newsletter Editors' then they would probably all be 5-star. And if all the content, styles, and formats were rated as to their usefulness they would collectively rate 10 out of 10 for being an integral building block of the Koitiata community."

Local Fire – what to do!

Concern has been voiced after the recent fire about the response time to a local call. It appears that there is some confusion in the village regarding how the local crew is alerted for a local fire. So this is what to do and how it works;

First, this is what you do;

- 1. If there is a fire, call 111 first!
- 2. Then get the siren switched on; break the glass and flick the switch!
- 3. Do this by *going to the fire shed yourself, or arrange for someone else to do it* while you are on the phone to the 111 service.
- Whoever turns the siren on needs to stay at the shed to tell the fire crew where the fire is.
- 5. But you must ring 111 first! And remember, it is better to have 4 or 5 people phone 111 than none at all.

Second, this is how it works;

- Our Koitiata fire crew members each have a pager that will be triggered by the 111 service controller.
- The first member to arrive at the shed *manually* starts the fire siren, (if not previously switched on by someone else).
- The local siren *is not* started by the 111 service controller. It can **only** be turned on at the fire shed.
- Because there is no guarantee that local fire crew see or are aware of the pager message, the siren is a key element for alerting the local crew.
- There is a fire alarm / siren switch on the outside wall at the fire shed. This can be used to start the siren by breaking the glass and switching it on.
- The 111 controller will have alerted the other fire stations directly, (Marton, Ratana, Wanganui etc).

In the case of any emergency, always

phone 111 in the first instance.

Army Exercise

The army are coming again. They will be setting up a base on the domain for a week from 5th to 12th October. During their exercise they will be armed, but there won't be any 'scare the dogs' and 'amusing the locals' shooting stuff this time.


