# **Before The Beginning**

The earliest reference for the name Koitiata is in two maps from pre-1909. They were created by T. W. Downes from "old Māori sketches" and show Koitiata Stream, but there is no Lake Koitiata or any other Koitiata recorded.

A 1914 map of Koitiata Survey District shows Koitiata Stream and Lake Koitiata, but whether Lake Koitiata was just missed off the 1909 maps or was a name applied by settlers is unknown. At that stage, those appear to be the only three uses of the name Koitiata. It is assumed that the Koitiata Survey District gained its title from the stream and/or lake name.


A report in The Rangitikei Advocate in July 1913, tells of Turakina Heads being very popular for camping and fishing during the summer. The area used was under lease from the Crown and farmed by Simpson Bros who permitted access. The report says that several Turakina residents were seeking to have land for a 'seaside resort'. A public meeting was held in Turakina in August 1913 and a committee was formed to pursue the resort project. They met with Mr. Duncan Simpson in August, and he stated that he was willing to relinquish some of his leased land for the resort. A January 1914 report stated that The Premier had advised Rangitikei County Council that the land requirement would be actioned, and Gazette issued.

A survey map dated 1915 shows the planned area for the un-named Seaside Resort. A later Koitiata Survey District map (circa 1917/18) shows the 165-acre reserve named as Koitiata Domain. The NZ Gazette recorded it as being, "reserve for the purpose of a Public Recreation Ground".


Once established its seaward boundary was set along the inland side of a road reserve, which ran along the riverbank and then south down the beach. The northern boundary was also established along a road reserve, which ran from Tunnel Hill, along the northern edge of where the village is now and out to connect with the riverbank road at the mouth of the Turakina River. Those road reserves were established in 1906 and existed before the Koitiata Domain was established. On current LINZ maps they still appear as originally established.

Koitiata Domain Recreation Reserve became the title for the reserve area in 2009.


The Survey District map (circa 1917/18) has an outline of a proposed Koitiata Town to be established within the domain, and this is the first recorded usage of the name Koitiata being applied to the town.


Plan of Seaside Resort, Sec 5 (part of Run 17)

### SEA-SIDE RESORT AT TURAKINA.

The Turnking Heads are new becoming a very popular resort for holiday seekers during the summer mouths, and within the past few years a counter of people have camped on the tanks of the Turnkina river and enjoyed the fishing in the river and the sea butling. Among the sandhills are several beautiful camping places, and through the kindness of Messrs Simpson Bros., who hold a lease of this land, advantage has been taken by a number of families to spend some very pleasant holidays avery from the bustle of the towns. Several Turaking residents are next interesting themselves in an endenyear to procure about 160 acres of this hand as a seaside resort, and there is no doubt that if they are successful in indusing the Coveriement to yest a sufficient portion of this land in the Lethbridge Town Board, it will now be many years before it will become a nonular sea-Bide resort.

At present the Town Board has a forry reserve, about two miles from the mouth of the river, which is leased to Mr A. Glasgow, and the rent derived from this reserve is spent in planting capi grass Unfortungtely this reserve is inaccessible both from the seashere and Turakina, as the read has been washed away by the river shifting its course. Originally this reserve was used as a capaping place for cattle travelling along the coast, but on account of its present isolated position the Town Board has leased the reserve for grazing purposes, as it is practically useless as a scanide camping place. .

It is the intention of the Turnking enthusiasts to call a meeting of persons degirous of establishing a seaside resort at the mouth of the Toraking river, and with the co-speration of residents along the main read to Marton, there is every likelihood of their claims being recognised by the Department, as it is understood that the Oroven Lands Runger Last reported very favourably on the site. A deputation will, in all probability, be appointed at this baseling to wait upon the authorities in Wellington to further their cause, and there is very little doubt that the Department will grant the concession asked for 9

#### TURAKINA SEASIDE RESORT.

Yesterday afternoon a deputation consisting of Turakina and Marton restionts waited on Mr R K Simpson, chairman of Rangitikel

County Council.

Mr W H. Gimez, on behalf of the deparation stated that the object was to scentre a suitable reserve at the mouth of the Turnking River as a campling ground and seasing resort for the prople of the distinct explaining that the approach to the Leads was at present through private property, and stating that the cos brotation of the Council in this matter was desired

#### Land for Turakina Beach Resort

The Premier in his letter to the Rangitikei County Council Saturday stated that there was no necessity to introduce legislation to set apart portion of the run at the Tutaking River for a seaside resort. There is nower under the Land Act, 1908, to reserve Orown land, not withstanding that the same may be held under pastoral license, for any public domain. Messra Simpson Bros. have already generously decided to forego their title to this land, and there is no doubt that in a short time the sensing resort at Turakina will be open to the public, who should avail themselves of this popular meaus spending their summer holidays.

# SEASIDE RESORT AT TURAKINA

#### A WORTHY PROJECT.

In response to an announcement appearing in the Advocate convening a meeting of all those interested in acquiring a suitable area for a senside reserve at the mouth of the Turakina River, a number of Tarakena residents and a carload from Marton attended at the Town Hall at Tarakina to hear the convener's (Mr F. Sisson's) views on this excel-

leut project.

Mr P. Sisson obcupied the chair and stated that the object of the meeting was if possible to form; committee to take charge of the movement to acquire a piece of land at the mouth of the Turakina River as a public reserve for a reaside resort. # LIVERPOOL, Governor. ORDER IN COUNCIL.

At the Government Buildings at Wellington, this twenty sixth day of February, 1917.

#### Present :

THE HONOURABLE SIR JAMES ALLEN, K.C.B., PRESTOING IN COUNCIL.

D'y virtue of the powers and authorities vested in me by the twenty-sixth section of the Public Reserves and Domalos Act, 1908. I. Arthur William de Brito Savile, Barl of Liverpool, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, by and with the advice and consent of the Executive Council of the said Dominion, de hereby order and declare that the reserve for recreation in the Wellington Land District described in the Schedule hereto shall be and the same is hereby brought under the operation of and declared to be subject to the provinces of Part II of the said Act; and such reserve shall hereafter be known as the Kobiaca Domain, and be managed, administered, and dealt with as a public domain.

#### SCHEDULE.

ALL that area in the Wellington Land District, containing by admeasurement 165 acres 2 roods, more or less, being Section No. 5. Block I, Koitiata Survey District. Bounded towards the north by a public road, 1858-4 links; towards the north-east by Run No. 17, Block I aforesaid, 10103-4 links; towards the south-east by Run No. 17 aforesaid, 1405-1 links; and towards the south-west generally by a road reserve one chain wide from mean high-water mark along the sea-beach to the mouth of the Turakina River; thence by a road reserve one chain wide slong the eastern bank of the Turakina River; be all the aforesaid linkages more or less. As the same is delineated on the plan marked L. and S. 1/193a, deposited in the Head Office, Department of Lands and Survey, at Wellington, and thereon edged red.

#### LIVERPOOL. Governor.

WHEREAS by the three-hundred-end-twenty-first section of the Land Act, 1908, it is enacted that the Governor VV may from time to time, either by general or particular description, and whether the same has been surveyed or not, reserve from sale temporarily, notwithstanding that the same may be then held under pastoral license, any Crown lands which in his opinion are required for any of the purposes in the said section mentioned:

And whereas by the three-bundred-and-twenty-second section of the said Act it is provided that land temporarily reserved under the said three-hundred-and-twen; y-first section may, at the expiration of one month but not later than six months after the publication in the Gazette of notice of such temporary reservation, be permanently reserved, and that

notice of such permanent reservation shall be published in the Gazette:

And whereas by the sixty-ninth section of the Land for Septements Act, 1908, it is further provided that the Governor may from time to time, as he thinks fit, set aside reserves for any specified public purpose out of land acquired

under the last mentioned Act, provided that no land so acquired shall be set aside for endowments:

and whereas the lands specified in the first column of the Schedule hereto were, by the Warrants the dates of which are specified in the third column of the said Schedule, and the notifications of which were published in the Gazettes specified in the fourth column, temporarily reserved under the authority of the said Acts for the purposes specified in the

second column of the said Schedule :

Now, therefore, I, Arthur William de Brito Savite. Earl of Liverpool, the Governor of the Dominion of New Zealand, in purcuance and exercise of the powers and authorities conferred noon me by the said Acts, do hereby permanently reserve the lands so temporarily teserved as aforeseid, and enumerated in the first column of the Schedule hereto, for the purposes specified in the second column of the said Schedule, being the same purposes for which the said lands were so temporarily reserved as aforesaid.
